Yokkaichi Friendship Garden Rededication



In August 1964 many city officials and spectators attended the unveiling of the Yokkaichi Friendship Garden at Lincoln Park in downtown Long Beach. Yokkaichi Mayor Sukenori Hirata and Long Beach Mayor Edwin Wade watched as Miss Yokkaichi cut the ribbon to

the bridge which was a gift to Long Beach from Yokkaichi.

In 1989 the city of Yokkaichi added a Torii gate to the garden as their gift to Long Beach, and over the years, trees and plaques were gifted to enhance the park.



In 2013 the garden was relocated from downtown to **Recreation Park** on the corner of **7th Street and Federation**. The Torii gate and plaques were refurbished and a new Yokkaichi Garden sign was unveiled on November 8 to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the Long Beach and Yokkaichi Sister Cities.

The 13-member Yokkaichi delegation, LBYSCA Board members, donors and invited guests attended the re-dedication ceremony along with Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine Director George Chapjian and his staff who worked tirelessly to create the beautiful garden.
